
Teachers Say They Are More Respected and Prepared for Significant Change Heading into the New School Year

Lessons Gained in a Trial-by-Fire Environment

While only 17% believed their school was prepared for distance learning in the spring, they are ready to tackle the challenges of the new school year.

instructional methodologies.

55% of teachers

also **cite an increase in student engagement** thanks
to the use of digital platforms.

94% of educators continue to agree that students increasingly need more **social and emotional support**.
